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Parenting Project — Strengthening Families for a Stronger Community

The Second phase of the Parenting Project is underway. Having recognized the importance of parenting in nation building, the Stella Maris Foundation is partnering with Parenting Partners and a select group of parents from the Grants Pen Community in an effort to strengthen families.

Parents will undergo ten Focus Group training sessions during which issues such as Stress and Stress Management, Child Development, Gender Roles and Self esteem are discussed.

The facilitation sessions further enable parents to freely vent and discuss issues that commonly face parents in the inner city.

At the end of the project, Parenting Partners, the Stella Maris Foundation as well as parents and children of Grants Pen would have played a significant role in strengthening families in Grants Pen.

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
